Griffin's messy past life gets a new look

Imagine your pet being so derelict that you could not even recognise them.

Poor five-year-old Griffin had been neglected for a long time without proper care, leaving him in terrible pain and discomfort when he arrived at the Home.

"Our first priority was to administer pain relief to alleviate Griffin's suffering," said Dr Caroline Butler, senior veterinarian in the Home's shelter medicine department. Griffin's fur was in such a horrible condition that he had to be groomed under general anaesthetic.

"Griffin's skin was red raw. It was very swollen and covered in painful ulcers," said Caroline.

Even more heartbreaking, Griffin still had stitches from a desexing surgery that had been left for so long that his fur had completely grown over them.

"We had to gently and thoroughly clean the ulcerated area with antiseptic, and apply a topical treatment to help ease the inflammation," said Caroline.

We felt really sorry for Griffin but it didn't affect our love for him.

"Griffin was placed on a course of pain relief and anti-inflammatory medicine to keep him comfortable and allow the wounds to heal."

Thanks to the care of our vets and nurses, Griffin is well on the road to a full recovery with his new adoring owners, Sarah and Breydon.

"We felt really sorry for Griffin but it didn't affect our love for him. We just wanted him to feel like a part of our family and not to worry anything bad will happen to him again as we will always keep him safe," said Sarah.

Griffin's affection for Sarah and Breydon is often expressed in his passion for countless cuddles. It is that sort of gratitude that is priceless when choosing to adopt a pet.

"They (adoption dogs) need a second chance. No one's going to give it to them unless you do."

Percy the perseverant

Sometimes inspiration comes from the unlikeliest of places. Despite having his front left leg amputated, Percy's spirit remains unquashed.

The two-year-old arrived at the Home in January with a shocking injury where he severely dislocated his elbow.

"Percy's injury was more than likely when he fell from a height, perhaps an apartment building," said veterinary surgeon Dr Ton Tancharoen. "We suspect the injury was a week old and Percy was in severe pain before it alleviated." The decision to amputate Percy's leg was in the best interests of his welfare.

"The next day after the operation, Percy was as upbeat as ever," said Ton. "The staff loved him and his lovable personality. Percy was not afraid to come up to you and make friends."

New owner Lauren knows full well of Percy's infectious vigour for life.

It's something special watching them warm up to you and their environment. They're just so appreciative of you.)) "Percy is unlike any cat I've had before. He's like a dog who is just super happy and loves friends. He's super friendly and curious of everybody."
