Since welcoming Nyx into their home Elsa has shared such lovely updates with us.



Poor Karen was not in a good condition when she arrived at The Lost Dogs' Home. She required multiple procedures with our vet team, including patella surgery (because her kneecap was moving out of its normal place) and dental surgery to remove three painful rotten teeth.

Karen spent more than a month recovering from surgery in foster care. Then, once she was feeling better, she spent another few months in the care of our shelter awaiting adoption.

Despite going through a tough time in her life Karen took it all in her stride. She's tiny, but tough! We're very thankful to have generous supporters who help keep our doors open for pets like Karen.

It breaks our hearts when animals arrive in such bad condition and we make it our priority to help relieve their pain and get them comfortable as soon as possible.

Saffy needed major dental surgery, vet care and lots of TLC from our team to help prepare her for adoption. With extra health care needs we knew it was going to take someone special to give her the loving home she deserved. After more than a month in our care, Saffy's special someone came along. It was love at first sight when Sandra met this sweet girl, and their bond continues to grow stronger by the day.


It was a tender moment when Willy first met his foster dog Mila, a two-year-old Staffy cross.

A stress-free life for Sunny

How the behaviour team helped this lovely dog find her confidence

wo-year-old Sunny was picked up by our ambulance and brought into the shelter. We could see she was having a hard time managing her stress levels. We knew this would make everyday situations overwhelming for her, and make it difficult to find her a new home.

Sunny spent more than two months in our Behaviour Program working with her trainer, Erin, to help overcome stress in certain environments, such as being left alone. Sunny also showed signs of being frustrated with unfamiliar dogs.

Sunny was an absolute star student! She learnt so much and responded very well to her positive rewards-based training. We saw her stress melt away as she became a happy, confident dog.

When Stephen came along to adopt Sunny it was clear they were a great match. With Stephen, Sunny could

have a loving companion to play with and lots of space to run around. We were so happy to receive this update from Stephen.

"It's like Sunny has lived her full life here. She even has her own couch on the deck. Sunny stands and barks at the door when she wants to come in or go out. She gets along well with my brother's dog and enjoys a run on the farm. And she knows if visitors arrive, it's time to go and play together outside – she fetches her rubber chicken for us to throw."

We asked Stephen, how does it feel to be Sunny's new dad?

"I don't feel like a dad, more like a boyfriend! Sunny is very demanding of my time", he laughed, "but I absolutely enjoy her company. She especially enjoys our walk down to the mailbox every day and never leaves my side. She is a very happy dog and I'm very happy too."

The challenge of finding this sweet cat a home

DJ's long list of special needs meant an extraordinary search for a special new owner

t's so rewarding when our special needs pets find their forever home, especially when they've been waiting a long time for an adopter to choose them. Thanks to the generosity of supporters we can provide the extra care some pets desperately need.

Soon after DJ arrived in our care she was diagnosed with feline asthma. It means she needs daily medication in the form of an inhaler. We also discovered this gorgeous girl has FIV (Feline Immunodeficiency Virus), so she needs to be kept inside and away from other cats. FIV is a virus that affects the body's immune cells. It can't be transmitted to people but can be spread to other cats through bites.

Despite her health conditions we could see that DJ was determined to enjoy life to the fullest! She spent more than two months living with a dedicated foster carer who told us how much DJ loved belly rubs, playing and cuddling.

We knew it would likely take a bit longer for DJ to be adopted because of her long list of special needs. But good things take time, and that was proven when Kaden came along. Kaden was more than willing to give a lifetime of love and care to a special needs pet like DJ.

We were thrilled to get this lovely update from Kaden about DJ. We couldn't be happier for them both!
