A dedicated foster carer shares why she opens-up her home to animals in need.

atalie is one of our dedicated carers and she has already provided a loving foster home to 25 animals from our shelters as they prepare to find their forever families. Natalie has cherished every one of her foster animals, but she couldn't help but form an especially strong bond with foster kitten, Ruth.

At only a few weeks old, Ruth came to us as a stray. This tiny kitten clearly had a rough start to life, and she needed multiple surgeries on her eyelids. Natalie kindly put up her hand to take Ruth into her home so she could spend six months recuperating in the comfort of foster care.

"Ruth and I became very attached to one another. She was special because she was incredibly affectionate with some quirky habits. She liked to sit on my shoulder all the time — even when I was cleaning the house or trying to brush my teeth!"

When animals are too young to be adopted, recovering from illness or surgery, or just not coping well in the busy shelter environment — a temporary home is exactly what they need in order to thrive.

We are so grateful for our network of incredible foster carers who volunteer their time to welcome animals into their home for the special care they need.

After a long journey, Rogan is a whole new dog thriving in his forever home!

hen we first met Rogan, he was so afraid that he would sit at the back of his pen and tremble whenever he saw a person. We knew he was going to need extra support, so he was placed into our Behaviour Program. Sometimes pets come to our shelter and we don't know what kind of traumas they may have experienced, but we do know that they will need compassion, dedication and patience to help them build up their confidence and trust, ready for the big world.

It can take quite some time to do this for a scared dog like Rogan. Our Behaviour Team works with dogs like Rogan to help them overcome their fear and set them up for success in a forever home, no matter how long this takes. Through gentle, force-free training methods, Rogan learned lots of new skills. Over time, he came out of his shell to show us the sweet, friendly, and happy dog he really is. His progress made us all so proud!

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Rogan's sweet disposition at the meet-andgreet was the clincher for me. When he is sitting next to you, he will pop a paw up on your leg or hand to let you know he wants a pat. He is so polite! My morning walks have a bit more purpose now and the pace is set to help Rogan. I can see the enrichment he has already brought to my home life. While he does need ongoing care for his anxiety, and plenty of patience, his presence is a delight."

It took more than four months – 141 days in our care – for Rogan to reach the point when he was ready for adoption. He was going to need a supportive family who were willing to continue his training and help him thrive. That's exactly what he found in Tim. All of us at the Home shared in celebrating this long-awaited adoption!

Why shelter pets are the perfect choice!

Setting the record straight, why adoption is the best option

Shelter pets are devoted creatures who want nothing more than a family to love and a home to call their own.

Sadly though, shelter pets are sometimes misunderstood. Myths about shelter pets suggest they are 'lesser' or 'not as good' as pets purchased from breeders or pet shops.

There are many reasons why a shelter pet is the perfect choice for your family, and why adoption is the best option.

We want to set the record straight!

Myth #1:

Purchasing from a breeder guarantees you'll get a perfect pet

Pets often end up in shelters through no fault of their own. Their owner may have moved into a nursing home, no longer have the money to care for them, or be dealing with other significant challenges that prevent them from giving their pet the time and care needed.

Shelter pets do sometime need extra support to help them settle into their new home and routine, but the same goes for any pet, regardless of where they came from.

Myth #2:

Shelter pets have health problems

Most dogs and cats available for adoption at shelters are mixed breeds. As a general rule, mixed breeds have fewer genetic health issues and have been known to live longer than their pure-bred counterparts. Of course, a pet's health status can change over the years.

All pets up for adoption at the Home have been examined by our vet team to ensure they are healthy and ready for adoption.



Myth#3:

Shelter pets cost too much

Adoption fees help to cover only a very small portion of the total cost of caring for and preparing a pet for adoption.

All pets adopted from The Lost Dogs' Home are microchipped and desexed before they go to their new homes.



Myth #4:

Shelters only have older pets, not puppies or kittens

Pets of all ages arrive at shelters, from newborns to seniors, and everything in between. Puppies and kittens are very popular and are generally adopted very quickly, while adult and senior pets often wait a little bit longer to find new homes.

Myth #5:

Shelter pets won't hond with their new family

Shelter pets are equally as loyal and devoted as pets purchased from a breeder or pet shop. In fact, our adopters often say their pets seem to know they've been given a second chance at having a happy life, and they're all the more loving and grateful for it.
