Hello friends! Some important news on the Arden Urban Renewal Precinct.



uring the latter part of last year, we received confirmation that our North Melbourne shelter facilities will make way for the new Arden Urban Renewal Precinct and we must relocate. Although this may at first sound worrying, we see this as a potentially exciting opportunity for the Home.

The Temporary Home for Lost and Starving Dogs opened on 28 February 1913 in Gracie Street, North Melbourne and since that time, the shelter facilities have been in a constant state of rebuilds, upgrades, and repairs.

Our staff have remained steadfast and determined to provide outstanding animal welfare care despite these challenges and we are leading the way in adopting 'shelter medicine' as the accepted procedure for how we care for our animals. We use 'herd health' principles to keep the large numbers of animals we have in our shelters healthy and safe. At the same time, we make sure the individual health and happiness of each animal in our care is catered for.

The chance to build a new, modern facility that can so much better support this kind of best practice animal welfare, as well as be a great place for our staff to work, is an exciting one.

We are continuing our intense negotiations with government to make the welfare of our animals remains at the centre of all decisions being made.

I'm looking forward to being able to update you on important developments as discussions progress. However, this will be a very lengthy process and our expectation is that we will be operating from our North Melbourne site for at least the next three to five years.

In the meantime, we will continue to operate business as usual in caring for the most vulnerable animals in Victoria. Please enjoy the many wonderful stories of 'happy ever afters' captured in this edition of Best Mates. They have all been made possible thanks to your wonderful and ongoing support.

hen Owen came to us, he was in bad shape. Danijela and her mum Gordana found this poor little cat shivering all by himself in a car park. Danijela recalls, "I stopped the car and called Mum, who came down with a blanket. And that's when his injuries became obvious." We don't know exactly what hurt Owen, but we suspect a car may have crushed his tiny paws.

Dr Ton, Lead Veterinary Surgeon at Frank Samways Vet Clinic, was ready to do whatever it took to help Owen live a life where he could move around without pain or limitations. He said, "Owen fractured most of the long bones in his feet. He injured himself sometime before coming to us." Dr Ton performed surgery to carefully realign some of Owen's bones while attaching small plates to others.

Danijela and Gordana were quick to open their home to Owen as his foster carers, so he'd have a peaceful place to recover from his extensive surgery. And we're so pleased to tell you that they decided to give Owen a loving forever home!

Danijela shared, "Since Owen's casts came off, his legs have healed wonderfully, and his active kitten spirit keeps him busy exploring around the home. He loves playing, talking, and splashing in his water bowl! He also adores smooching, nuzzling, and making a little cave out of the blankets to settle under."

Owen is now having the time of his life chasing his favourite toys around his forever home!

Liz Walker, our Director of Operations explains, "This is revolutionary in terms of not only freeing up shelter space for the 15,000+ animals that come through our doors every year, but it means animals will have a better opportunity to find a home guicker."

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The biggest benefit is for the animal. Returning to a shelter environment could increase anxiety for a dog like Cupcake. With this program, we were active in helping find Cupcake a new home. And while she waited, she was able to be in a nice home with a family she is comfortable with."

As an Adoption Ambassador, Tania was able to get to know her foster dog Cupcake so she could help find Cupcake's perfect match. It also meant Cupcake could be adopted directly from Tania's care without having to come back into our busy shelters.

Keeping Stan calm and comfortable was challenging, but our team acted to reduce his stress while they carefully, but with as much speed as possible, cut around the can.

The moment of release was a glorious one for Stan and for the team! Everyone heaved a sigh of relief and in true cat style, he was very shortly walking around as if nothing had ever happened.

Despite his ordeal, a vet check revealed Stan was in good shape and we're pleased to report that he is now living his best life in his new forever home. Oblivious to his adventure, John and Annie fell in love this beautiful ginger gent as soon as they were introduced.

There are estimated to be around seven million stray cats living in urban areas across Australia. Life on the streets is tough for cats finding themselves in danger, or falling ill. If you are concerned a cat in your neighbourhood might be lost, the best thing is to try and get it back home.

Contact your council if you can't catch or handle the cat to check if it has ID. If it doesn't have ID take the cat to your local animal shelter or call your council.

Shelter staff can scan the animal for a microchip.


