hat's why we are delighted to have foster care heroes like Lee and Andrew who kindly open their home as a peaceful place for animals to relax on the couch and get lots of cuddles while they prepare for adoption.

You'll be amazed to hear how many animals Lee and Andrew have fostered through the Home—one puppy, six cats, and 51 kittens!

We asked Lee and Andrew a few questions about their experience as foster carers:

## Why did you decide to become foster carers with The Lost Dogs' Home?

We wanted more pets in our life, but we frequently travel with work, so it made it difficult to commit to a pet permanently. We found that fostering gives us the wonders of animals in our life whilst being able to fit their care into our schedule.

#### What is the best part about fostering?

We especially enjoy watching the kittens grow and develop. We've had kittens as young as one day old. It's incredible seeing them open their eyes, learn to walk, learn to feed, and start to play.

## What is your advice for anyone considering foster care?

Fostering is incredibly rewarding! You can specify the type of care you're comfortable with and you'll receive support along the way. The Home provides everything you need to get started—beds, blankets, carrier, bowls, food, litter, trays, toys.

### Shirley adopted Manaia in 2016 when he was four years old. Shirley and her husband absolutely adored Manaia, and so did their three children.

ne day, the unthinkable happened. Shirley looked outside her window and saw that Manaia wasn't in the backyard. He was gone.

Shirley told us:

"The fence had fallen down. We searched everywhere for Manaia. We contacted the Home and the council. I was devastated. I would walk around the streets looking for him."

Nobody knew what happened to Manaia. Two long years went by, with Manaia's family missing him every single day.

During this time, Shirley experienced even more heartbreaking loss. Tragically, her husband passed away.

Shirley remembers sitting at her husband's grave on the day before his birthday. It was then that something unbelievable happened...

"I saw an email on my phone, and I couldn't believe what it said. Manaia had been found! After all these years! It was surreal. I was so happy."

Manaia had been brought to the Home and, thankfully, he was microchipped. What an unforgettable moment it was to see Shirley and Manaia reunited.

"Manaia came to me straight away. It was as if he was never gone. I kept thinking, 'I can't believe you're here.'"

Shirley couldn't wait to take Manaia to visit her husband—and tell him the wonderful news that their sweet boy had come home. In front of her husband's grave, Shirley and Manaia sat side by side, together again at last.

"It was my husband's birthday that day. I said to him, 'Thank you for bringing Manaia back to me.' It was very emotional."

Shirley and Manaia now spend their days enjoying precious time together. "We're inseparable. He sleeps by my bed and follows me around the house. My kids are so happy that he's around. When I go out, they say, 'He waits for you to come home.' And I say, 'Of course he does. I'm his mum.'"

For the best chance of a happy reunion when the unexpected happens, please ensure your pets are microchipped and your contact details are up to date, just like Manaia.

In the last year alone, the Home has seen a staggering increase in puppies arriving at our doorstep.

e know the pandemic fuelled the creation of puppy farms. The cost of living crisis has reduced the numbers of people willing or able to pay for puppies and demand has fallen.

The impact can be heartbreaking.

Puppies like Chunks and his littermates, Nico and Winnie, ended up at the Home in desperate need of care. Not only was it clear that Chunks, Nico and Winnie needed vital veterinary care, but these poor little pups were also so frightened and timid. Our dedicated team will always welcome animals with open arms, no matter what their situation. Chunks, Nico, and Winnie underwent thorough health checks, with Chunks being treated for a painful ear infection. They were also desexed and had ultrasounds to listen to their hearts. Sadly, little Winnie was diagnosed with a serious heart murmur that would affect her lifespan.

All three puppies were placed in foster care so they could gain confidence while experiencing the love and socialisation of a home life that they had been missing.

We're so pleased to share that Chunks, Nico and Winnie each found their forever homes! Their loving new families have committed to continuing regular check-ups to monitor the puppies' conditions, for their best chance at a happy life.

Dr Ton explains: "Clinical exams, behaviour assessments and routine diagnostics are done at the shelter before surgery is performed on an animal. More complex soft-tissue procedures and orthopaedics, such as cruciate ligament repairs, are done at the Frank Samways Veterinary Clinic."

Working across both the shelter and Clinic it is no surprise that Dr Ton is happy, challenged and fulfilled by his work!

Dr Ton and the Frank Samways team are always delighted to welcome new clients. Most especially because every new client not only signs up to receive exceptional health services for their pet, but by doing so, they 'pay it forward' and provide the very same exceptional care for our beautiful shelter animals too.
